### OPP: Two murders in three weeks not linked

While it's unknown what happened at a Tory Hill house in the early hours Saturday morning, tributes have been pouring in for Dylan Robert Dahlke, a 29-year-old Dysart man killed in an alleged homicide.

The second murder investigation in Haliburton County in less than three weeks also has the community reeling.

OPP have charged Robert Ferguson, 58, of Highlands East with second degree murder in connection with the July 6 incident. Dahlke was well known in the area. Friend Brit Lyn told *The Highlander* his death is both "sad" and "terrifying." No longer a resident of the county, she

said she first met Dahlke 10 or 11 years ago when she moved back to Haliburton to look

after her grandmother. She was working at a downtown restaurant and Dahlke was a regular who came in for coffee. He was well-mannered and polite, Lyn said.

"He was an old soul and a good and kind human."

She added that Dahlke also befriended her young son "and he always took a moment to teach him something everyday."

She said she had not seen him as much in recent years, but only a few weeks ago ran into him at the Foodland in Wilberforce. It brought back some "awesome memories" of times they had hung out together.

"He's going to be missed. He always had your back, no matter what. He didn't deserve that."

Tributes have also come in to the Highlander's Facebook page. At press time, the Sunday posting of the breaking news story had reached more than 23,000 people, and garnered more than 70 comments and almost 250 shares.

Leo Henry wrote, "Such a tragedy. Dylan was a real good fella. Would lend a hand before you asked him.

Comical, genuine person. Happy I had the pleasure of many visits and laughs with him. Condolences to his family. Dylan will be sadly missed."

Police update

Det. Insp. Jim Gorry of the OPP Criminal Investigation Branch in Kingston told *The Highlander* Tuesday there is no link between the July 6, and a June 18 homicide. That was reiterated by Detective Staff Sargent Kurtis Fredericks, the lead investigator in the June homicide, who is based in Orillia.

Less than three weeks prior to Saturday's incident, police arrested and charged a Haliburton man, Norman Hart, 33, with second degree murder in connection with a death in the village on June 18. Robert James Brown, 49, of Haliburton was killed shortly before 1 a.m. at a home on Highland Street.

On July 6, Gorry said police responded to a call at 5 a.m. He said Ferguson and Dahlke were acquaintances, further describing them

as "buddies," and that both were staying in the house the night of the incident.

Gorry would not comment on what happened. He said he was still awaiting reports from Dahlke's post mortem

examination in Toronto
Monday as well as Ferguson's
bail hearing, also on July 8. He
said the investigation is still in its
early days.

OPP issued a media release just after 3 p.m. Sunday, saying members of the Haliburton Highlands detachment, with help from their crime unit and OPP Forensic Identification Services (FIS), were investigating the homicide in Highlands East on July 6. They said there was no fear for public safety.

Fredericks said that he could not publicly comment further on his ongoing investigation of the village homicide. He said officers still had a number of people to talk to.



### **EORN** finally crosses funding finish line Feds agree to provide \$71 million

After years of lobbying, the Eastern Ontario Regional Network (EORN) has secured \$71 million in federal funding it needs to proceed with a massive mobile broadband project.

The federal government announced July 4 it will help pay for the \$213 million initiative. The project aims to improve cellular and network coverage in eastern Ontario. With municipalities, the province and the federal government all on board now, EORN is preparing to make the initiative happen.

EORN board member and Minden Hills Mayor Brent Devolin said there is relief in getting funding in place.

"It's definitely years of hard work," Devolin said. "I know it can't happen fast enough for many of us within Haliburton County.'

The project's goals include: achieving 99 per cent of the eastern Ontario region having voice call service levels; 95 per cent coverage for standard-definition service and 85 per cent coverage for high-definition service. EORN will also invest \$34 million into increased capacity for high-density

"This project will allow Eastern Ontario rural municipalities to be better connected and ensure that residents have improved access to online services," Minister of Rural Economic Development Bernadette Jordan said in a press release.

Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock MP Jamie Schmale said although the announcement pleased him, he is unhappy about how long it took. The initiative has been in the works since 2016.

"While today's announcement is a positive step forward, it also is met with frustration, as the government has had the EORN

project application on their desk for over two years with little to no movement," Schmale said.

Devolin said getting funding approved can take time given the complexities of governments. But he added regional municipalities pushing it as a number one issue helped get it forward.

"We all wish it was better but it is what it is," he said. "What you need to do is be pragmatic, keep your focus, not be distracted."

The province is also committing \$71 million, or one-third funding. Municipalities are contributing \$10 million, while the remaining \$61 million is expected to come from mobile carriers through a competitive bidding process.

Devolin said he expects no problems getting the private sector funding.

"They are as encouraged and aggressive to get on this as any of the rest of us," he said With the money secured, Devolin said EORN will soon meet to plan out how the project will roll out and determine what areas to address first.

That planning process could take the rest of the year, Devolin said, with multiple years of work ahead after that. But Haliburton stands to be one of the biggest beneficiaries when improvements start coming online.

"This is a really important day for Haliburton County," he said.

On The Highlander's Facebook page, local business owner Colby Marcellus said on Lochlin Road, they pay a lot of money for practically non-existent internet service. They typically have to use their cell phone data to get online. "As business owners, we rely heavily on internet access. In this day and age, solid, high speed access is essential to a vibrant community. This shouldn't be

### HE following signs to economic development

Highlands East is overhauling its municipal signage in an effort to better guide people around the township.

Council approved the implementation of a new sign policy July 9. The policy, billing itself as stage one, focuses on addressing signs, outlining regulations, amenities and wayfinding.

Economic development co-ordinator Joanne Vanier said those targets are to make the greatest amount of impact in a short amount

"By replacing deteriorating signage and installing signage that has been lacking, we can effectively increase the visual identity of the municipality, identify assets, and enhance the visitor experience," Vanier said.

The policy states they should include the municipal logo, which also highlights the motto "yours to explore" and the township website. Vanier's report said because of poor marking, people are unaware of numerous municipal assets, such as more than 30 public boat launches.

"I was totally impressed by the amount of work that has been put into this," Coun. Cam McKenzie said. "Well done team."

New signs in this stage will also include

internal information like landfill hours and park usage. Signs identifying amenities like parks and directing traffic will also be replaced.

Other categories, including municipal gateways, community buildings and community identification will be addressed later.

Deputy mayor Cec Ryall said the private sector also wants to be involved and have new markers directing people toward their businesses.

"It's a great opportunity but it also has some great challenges associated with it," Ryall said, noting sign pollution is a concern. "They'd be willing to absorb the cost for their particular entity. So, another opportunity for economic development."


He also said although it would not be part of this first stage, private sector partnership could be explored at a future date.

Ryall also raised county-wide signage at the county's tourism committee meeting April 10. Committee chair Carol Moffatt said although it has been identified as an issue, it will take more time to address at the county

Highlands East has earmarked \$40,000 for the initiative to be used by March 2020.

### Composters on way to **Highlands East**

Highlands East is providing a new way for residents to manage organic waste.

Council voted July 9 to purchase 40 composters and 25 digesters, to be resold to the public at the same cost.

The initiative aims to help reduce the amount of organic waste in landfills.

"This is a really important move," Coun. Suzanne Partridge said.

The initiative is being undertaken in partnership with Dysart et al. The municipality is also waiting to hear back from Minden Hills and Algonquin Highlands as to their interest.

Chief administrative officer Shannon Hunter raised concern over the logistics of the project, such as where the devices would be stored.

Partridge responded the environment committee could work that out.

### Waste Wizard app

The municipality is introducing a magical new way to keep you informed about waste disposal.

Council approved an agreement to introduce the Waste Wizard Web App to the municipality.

It will provide information for all residents and municipal visitors about waste management.

Environmental supervisor Stewart Hurd said there is a need to improve residents knowledge

"The municipality is in need of a

tool that will assist with a desired increase in diversion and reduction in contamination," he said.

The app is being introduced in partnership with Algonquin Highlands.

The two municipalities will share the yearly subscription cost, which amounts to each paying \$1,437 annually.

### Municipal insurance rises 47 per cent

Highlands East is being forced to pay a more than \$60,000 increase in its insurance premium this year.

Council approved its insurance coverage for the year from July 1, 2019 - July 1, 2020, which amounted to \$226,644. This represented a 47 per cent increase from last year's \$159,184.

Treasurer Brittany McCaw said this increase was unexpected and "due to a significant claim pay out in 2019."

"Details regarding the significant claim pay out are not available at this time," McCaw told *The Highlander*.

McCaw recommended the municipality continue its coverage insurance with BFL Canada this year, which it has had

However, she added staff plan to go out to market for a new insurance proposal

The coverage addresses liabilities, such as coverage for user groups renting and using municipal facilities.

### Clinic hopes for pot luck in lottery

### Capturing Eden to apply for retail licence

Haliburton could soon be home to cottage country's first pot shop. The medical cannabis assessment clinic Capturing Eden in Dysart et al is planning to go for a retail licence in the second provincial lottery, announced by the province July 3. If successful, the store could be selling retail cannabis as early as October

Owner Stephen Barber always planned for his business to sell cannabis eventually. He said it would be a way to help an underserviced region.

"We'd like to be able to help the communities that we're involved with," Barber said. "We don't want people to have to travel or go to places that they don't really want to go."

The store faces competition due to the province only making a limited number of licences available. There will only be 42 new non-reserve licences. Seven of those have been allotted to the east region, which includes Haliburton and stretches from Barrie to Ottawa. Only Kingston and Ottawa currently have stores in the region.

Barber said although he'd prefer the application process be based more on merit, he has prepared the store ahead

of time to fit all the regulations.

"We have a self-contained store where we have all the security," he said. "We should have a good shot."

This is the first opportunity for smaller communities to get stores in Ontario. Only 25 retail locations opened in April after the initial lottery and only in places with more than 50,000 people.

Although online ordering for retail cannabis is available, the nearest physical location for people in Haliburton to purchase is in Oshawa or Toronto.

Barber said if he is successful, he still intends to maintain the clinic side of the operation. But he added it remains to be determined whether he would be allowed to provide medical cannabis.

### Implementation funding unspent

The County of Haliburton, Dysart et al and other area municipalities have already opted-in to allow for the stores within their borders.

To help navigate the change, every municipality in the province received money to manage the drug's legalization. The County of Haliburton received \$66,961, Dysart et al \$22,082, Minden Hills \$18,771,

Algonquin Highlands \$12,917 and Highlands East \$13,912.

However, the funding has gone unspent. Both the county and Dysart et al have confirmed their allotted funds have yet to be used.

The county's deputy CAO and director of planning Charsley White said the county's funding will be a discussion for council at a later date.

"Awaiting to see what those costs are (for cannabis implementation)," she said.

Cannabis-related traffic crime has not gone up within Haliburton amidst legalization. From Oct. 17, 2018, when cannabis was legalized, to June 30, 2019, Haliburton Highlands OPP detachment indicated there three cannabis offences, all traffic-related. That is down from the same time the previous year, when there were 16 cannabis offences, six traffic related, according to the detachment." Barber said a store in Haliburton would help counteract the black market, a federal aim of legalization.

"It would be really significant,"
Barber said. "People in Haliburton
right now have to travel quite a
distance to get recreational, and they
don't always know exactly what
they're getting."



### TSW doing a good job

I never thought I'd hear it.

I specifically went to the Soyers Lake Cottage Owners Association AGM this past Saturday because I wanted to hear the latest from the Coalition for Equitable Water Flow, or CEWF.

CEWF's chair, Ted Spence, was the guest speaker.

Incidentally, he'll be at the MBC meeting this Saturday morning at the Stanhope Firefighters Community Hall.

I'd encourage any waterfront owner to attend as his power-point presentation is packed with information. I learned things about Parks Canada and the Trent Severn Waterway, as well as about CEWF, that I didn't know.

For those who don't know, CEWF is a volunteer organization established in 2006 to provide input to the Panel on the Future of the Trent Severn Waterway. It aims to represent the interests of more than 30,000 waterfront property owners on reservoir and flow-through lakes in Haliburton and Northern Peterborough Counties. There are 32-member lake associations, the majority in the county.

After viewing Spence's 39-slide powerpoint, I now have a better handle on how complex managing the system is. I won't be so quick to criticize and judge the TSW.

Neither is CEWF, with Spence saying the

words I never thought I'd hear from CEWF.

"They've done a pretty good job of it." Since 2016, the TSW has made their water management decisions based on a lot more data and analysis. For example, they've added real-time snow gauges to augment manual readings. They've upped their weather forecasting game. They do a better job of monitoring inflow and outflow. They do a precipitation and runoff model. They've also done routing models to see how the water flows.

Despite the fact we are seeing more extreme weather, such as milder winters with more rain and snow and more summer storms, we are not seeing the same flooding that we did in 2013 and 2017. In fact, more water ran through the system this year than in those years, and Minden was not flooded out.

As Spence pointed out, in 2019, even with 3.5 times the normal snowpack at the end of March and 180 per cent of normal rain in April, the flood levels were less than in 2017.

Of course, the Burnt River basin is taking the hit now.

Parks Canada announced the first of its summer drawdowns this past Friday. For most, it's viewed as a good thing since the reservoirs are still quite high. With some predicting possible drought-like conditions, we'll be interested to see how the rest of the summer unfolds.

Spence also provided some valuable information to waterfront owners that we would like to pass

Review your infrastructure and if appropriate make changes now to your dock systems, electrical and boat storage.

Be aware of the increased risk of low lake levels earlier in the season and at levels not previously experienced.

Finally, review infrastructure for low levels, including water lines, access, boat mooring, etcetera.

You can also do your bit by staying informed.

Nowadays, people cannot say that they didn't know, as both Parks Canada, the TSW and the CEWF provide volumes of information on their websites.

### CEWF: TSW 'finally' knows what it's doing

With the Trent Severn Waterway (TSW) announcing its first drawdown of the season July 5, it seemed the perfect time for the chair of the Coalition for Equitable Water Flow (CEWF) to address a cottage association annual general meeting in Haliburton County this past weekend.

Ted Spence was the guest speaker at the Soyers Lake AGM at the Pinestone Saturday and will do a repeat performance at the Maple, Beech and Cameron Lake AGM this coming Saturday.

The coalition, which represents more than 30,000 waterfront property owners, including many in Haliburton County, has been lobbying the TSW for equitable water flows since 2006.

Spence told the audience it seems their message has been heard.

"I believe they do know what they're doing, finally," he said.

Spence said there has been a managerial focus since 2013 on minimizing the risk of flooding.

He said the TSW uses data, analysis and science today "and it's a whole different business."

For example, the CEWF chair said the TSW had recently installed five, real time snow gauges that not only measure the depth of snow but the amount of water in it. Three are in Haliburton County. In addition, he said they still go out manually every

week to measure how much snow is on the ground.

In summer, he said they have 21 automatic rain gauges and all of the reservoir dams have automatic gauges.

"So, we're really well covered with data ... they have a much better picture than they ever had before."

Spence said he attended a recent TSW session in Campbellford and the operations manager had, on his cell phone, that morning's readings for more than 100 different things in the system.


"He had last night's rainfall on each of the gauges, he had the flows at each of the spots and then he had the recommendations from his manager as to what his team should be doing with the dams. I mean this happens every morning." Spence said.

He said they also run models.

"Everybody says 'what have those idiots done?' Well, actually, they measured the rainfall, they measured the amount of water stored upstream, they know how much water's there, they decide how much to manipulate your dam," he said.

Spence said 2016-2018 are good examples of years in which most people were happy with water levels. However, he said the TSW managed this while coping with extremes.

"I mean what they had behind the scenes to manage would have probably been a much more serious problems for

us, both high waters and low waters, if we were dealing with a different style of management than we are now."

In 2016, it was drought like at mid-August. The TSW managed by maintaining minimum flows downstream to protect the northern reservoirs, Spence said.

With climate change and new norms of

milder winters with more rain, sudden thaws and wetter summers, Spence said it is important to get it right.



### Committee "calms water" on fire halls

The Highlands East Fire Committee addressed the concerns of its most vocally worried fire hall users in a series of questions relating to an ongoing service review.

The committee spent much of its July 8 meeting addressing a submitted list of questions from members of Station 2 in Highland Grove. The questions grilled the committee on its process for the review.

But committee chair Cam McKenzie and acting fire chief Chris Baughman made repeated assurances that no substantive decisions have been made. Station 2 captain Gary Burroughs attended as an audience member and called it a calming effort.

"I wanted to just hear if there's clarity," Burroughs said. "If I was to sum it up, I'd say they just calmed the water with everything."

The committee has put forward a series of options to explore in its service review, including maintaining the status quo, shifting from five fire halls to three, searching for efficiencies in equipment and building a new central fire hall while either maintaining or closing other halls.

Station 2 made clear in their questions which option they preferred.

"We would like to see the status quo be the way forward," one question said. "With the large coverage area, and the aging population that needs our services more than they ever have. Just because the number of fire-related calls are down does not mean we should cut fire equipment."

"There's been no recommendations to cut services or halls or equipment at this point," Baughman retorted. "Anything presented to council will come to the public first in a public meeting."

Baughman later reported to the committee about ongoing data collection for the halls. After reviewing three years worth of utilities, he said he could not find anything which stood out.

"No hall is much greater than the rest," he said. "Saving the hydro bill on a hall isn't going to make or break a hall."

He added he is awaiting the completion of a municipal facilities review before submitting more data. That is not expected to be done until the fall.

Burroughs said although there are assurances no major decisions have been made yet, any big changes could get met with resistance.

"The proof will be in the pudding as soon as they come to an end," he said. "If this gets shoved through without us knowing anything about it, there will be a big uprise for sure."

### Turtle guardian wins major conservation award

Conservationist Leora Berman's days are busy as she gives children hands-on lessons about turtles and the value they bring to the ecosystem.

Berman is running summer camp to teach kids to be turtle guardians. Whether trying to save turtles, improve lake health, teach about shorelines or start a children's museum, she keeps herself occupied.

"It's just the way God built me. I can't sit still," Berman said. "I can't look at a problem and not try to do something. I haven't even reached the targets that I wanted. I've only just begun."

The Haliburton native's conservation work was recognized with the 2019 Canadian Wildlife Federation's Roland Michener Conservation Award in June. She will also be featured in upcoming editions of the Canadian Wildlife and Biosphère magazine

"I'm over the moon," she said about receiving the award. "It's a different kind of humbling."

Berman is currently the chief operating officer of The Land Between, a grassroots environmental organization which does work across eastern Ontario. She has also worked for Ducks Unlimited Canada, Wildlife Habitat Canada and the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry over her 22-year career.

The eligibility for the award, named after Canada's former Governor General, is "any individual who has demonstrated a commitment to conservation through effective and responsible activities that promote, enhance and further conservation of Canada's natural resources."

Berman's friend Tracey McCann said she submitted the nomination and felt Berman was deserving.

"I don't think she gets enough recognition for the work she does," McCann said. "I figured she deserved a big thank you."

Berman said all of her conservation jobs have motivated her. But she found The Land Between suited her especially well and gave her more freedom than government work. As the group's co-founder, she said it started as a one-year project but ended up much larger than imagined.

"I don't know if it is a problem but I always go big," she said. "You've got to shoot high. Otherwise, you're not going to make it."

Winning the conservation award also helps put a new spotlight on the Haliburton Highlands, Berman added.

"It is encouraging to be able to represent the conservation sector in this way, but also to showcase the Highlands," she said. "This area, also known as the Land Between bioregion, is so vibrant and also essential to our collective future and well-being in Ontario."

She sees the area as something worth vital and worth fighting for. "They're certainly my heart and

soul, the highlands," she said.



The Drag and Spruce Lakes Property Owners Association presented two charitable donations at this year's annual general meeting.

The funds were given to Abbey Retreat Centre (ARC) and Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary (WWS) as a way to give back to the Haliburton community.

Doug Norris, executive director of ARC, said it is always nice when small associations donate to causes like theirs because it shows that the centre is making an impact in the county.

He said the centre is used as a retreat space for those undergoing cancer treatment and when there isn't one planned, it is a rentable space for the community.

Monika Melichar, founder of WWS, explained to meeting attendees the importance of rehabilitation facilities for animals and went into detail about the work the sanctuary does.

"We're 100 per cent volunteer based, which I think is pretty impressive," she said. "We have over 100 animals in our care which keeps us hopping all day long so we're very thankful for the donation that will help with the supplies we need."

She noted that a portion of the land will soon be used specifically for injured turtles as the clinic in Peterborough is becoming over-populated.

Donations to local organizations is something the association does every year and will continue to do so as long as the money is available.

The annual meeting also featured presentations from Dysart deputy mayor Pat Kennedy, councillor Larry Clarke and fire Chief Mike Iles.

They spoke about things happening in the township that cottagers and property owners need to know, such as fire alarms, tax increases, composting and road repairs.







### Watch out for heat warnings

When hot, humid weather hits Haliburton County this summer, take precautions to beat the heat, the local health unit advises.

This summer, the Haliburton, Kawartha, Pine Ridge District Health Unit will issue public warnings in the leadup to extremely warm conditions.

A heat warning will be issued when day-time temperatures are forecast to be 31°C or higher, with a minimum day-time low of 20°C or higher, for two consecutive days. A heat warning is also issued if the humidex will be  $40^{\circ}\text{C}$  or higher for two consecutive days. The health unit will issue an extended heat warning when the same conditions apply, but the heat event is expected to last for three or more days in a row. Notifications will be posted on the health unit's Facebook (facebook.com/HKPRDHU) and Twitter (twitter.com/HKPRDHU) pages. Information is also available by calling the health unit at 1-866-888-4577, ext. 5006.

"Heat-related illnesses can take a toll on many people, especially infants, older adults and people with chronic conditions," says Melissa Johnstone, emergency management coordinator with the health unit.


"If a heat warning is issued, residents are encouraged not to overdo things and instead drink plenty of water and seek out cool places.'

During heat warnings, many municipalities open cooling centres where people can visit to beat the heat. Johnstone suggests people contact their local municipality for the locations of cooling centres in their community.

People are also encouraged to: • Avoid going out in the sun or heat when possible. • Stay cool, and if possible, stay in an air-conditioned place. If your home does not have air conditioning, go to the shopping mall, library, community centre, or

friend's house. • Stay in the shade as much as possible. If you plan to go outside during a very hot day, do so early in the morning or evening when it is cooler. • Avoid outdoor sports and physical activity. • Wear loose-fitting, light clothing and a wide brimmed hat. · Drink lots of water, even if you don't feel very thirsty. Avoid alcohol, coffee/ tea and pop. • Check in regularly with vulnerable family, friends, neighbours and others who could be affected by the heat. These include children, older adults and persons with chronic illnesses. Make sure they are OK and are well-hydrated. • Avoid heavy meals that involve using the oven or other hot appliances. • Keep shades, drapes and blinds closed on the sunny side of your home, but keep windows open slightly. If you do not have air conditioning, use fans. • Keep lights off or turned low. • Take a cool bath or shower periodically, or cool down with cool, wet towels. • Never leave a child

or pet in a closed, parked vehicle.



### Be aware of burning regulations

Fire season runs from April 1 to Oct. 31 each year in Haliburton County except in Highlands East, where it extends to Nov. 30. Regulations for burning differ among the four municipalities so it's important to know yours.

During fire season, the burning of brush etc. is prohibited during daylight hours as classified by each municipality (exceptions may apply via permit or other conditions). Following are the daylight hours classifications and examples of additional regulations for each municipality.

Algonquin Highlands – You may burn brush and leaves without a permit between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. under

certain conditions, including size. Grass fires are prohibited.

Dysart et al – Following a bylaw change in 2019, burning is now permitted from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. under certain conditions, including size.

Highlands East – Only environmentally friendly materials may be burned. Small fires are permitted in most areas from one half hour before sunset to one half hour after sunrise under certain conditions, including setback.

Minden Hills – Burning is permitted from two hours before sunset to two hours after sunrise under certain conditions, including size.

Fines for violations are levied in all four municipalities. For full details on

the fire season in your area, including campfire allowances, burning conditions, permit requirements, exceptions and fines, contact your municipality.

NOTE: The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and the municipalities retain the authority to declare a ban on all outdoor burning if atmospheric conditions become extreme or local circumstances warrant it. This includes fires for cooking and warmth. It is your responsibility to be aware of fire bans. Follow *The Highlander* on Facebook (facebook. com/TheHighlanderOnline) to ensure you receive notification if a fire ban is placed in your area. (*Lisa Gervais*)



# Cottage values continue to rise in Haliburton County

More listings, lower interest rates and cottages that can be used for part-time rentals are contributing to a strong Highlands real estate sales forecast.

"It is exciting to see the changes occurring in our local market," said Terry Carr, sales representative with ReMax North Country Realty Inc., in an email.

"After two years of a shortage of listings, 2019 promises to be a bit more balanced. There is still good demand for both waterfront and non-waterfront properties, but more listings equals a levelling-off of values. It is expected that home and cottage values will settle this year, [with fewer] multiple offers, but definitely a higher value than we have seen in past years."

With interest rates already dropping this year, the residential market has strengthened, partly because young people from Southern Ontario are realizing that owning a property where they work is just not feasible, said Carr.

"Haliburton County is quite tempting. As many people are used to commuting anyway, those not required to be in the office five days a week are loving the idea of living in our county. This is bringing a surge of everyone from young families right through to early retirees – it is great for our communities.

"The Highlands has always been a stable real estate market to invest in, and that certainly seems to be the continuing trend for the near future."

Cottage values continue to rise, and with them the trend of looking for a cottage that can be used as a part-time rental. Also, while at one time properties on the big boating lakes were a must-have, properties on smaller, more peaceful lakes have been rising in demand and value, and Carr foresees that trend continuing.


The Highlands saw 24 waterfront sales of \$800,000 and more in 2018, the highest number on record, and Carr said we may see an even higher number in 2019.

New construction in the residential market is also on the rise, added Carr.

"New waterfront construction seems stable other than a couple of specific lakes where new lots have been created. Choice waterfront lots are not numerous, and the number of buyers that can afford to build from scratch are limited, keeping this market relatively steady."

All in all, it's an exciting time to be in real estate in the Highlands, said Carr.

"After a couple of years of sellers reaping the rewards of listing shortages, 2019 looks to be rolling out as a more balanced market. This is great for everyone – both buyers and sellers, a sustainable market."

Young artists from Haliburton and Mexico learned, played and performed at the cross-cultural Camexicanus summer camp July 2-6.

Camexicanus has run since 2015, previously in the Kitchener/Waterloo area before shifting to Haliburton this year. Its Mexican students also tour and perform across Ontario, which is happening again this year following the camp.

Mexican camper and assistant music director Jose Siller is back for his second year with Camexicanus. He said it is a way to create bonds between countries. "Nowadays there's a lot of conflicts," Siller said. "We need more strengthening of our bonds."

He added the camp offers a unique learning experience in a different country. "This camp is bringing opportunities to a lot of students from Mexico that are interested in arts to go to Canada and live a whole experience," Siller said.

Haliburton-local Finn Tentrees was an assistant program director at this year's camp. Tentrees said it is a good way to expose kids to more diversity.

"It's always good to have something that supports art," he said. "Putting kids from Mexico with youth in Haliburton I think is amazing actually. Not a whole lot of diversity up here."

"For kids, they have this ability to reach out and to form relationships and art is just an incredible backdoor for that," Sadlier said.

The camp's Mexican contingent is now touring and performing across Ontario. But Camexicanus is also planning to bring Canadian campers to Mexico next year. Sadlier said beyond arts, the goal is to make good global citizens.

"We also believe in developing youth," Sadlier said. "Global citizens who are servants and who love others with selfless love."
