Highland Wood family upset over travel costs

The daughter of a man evacuated from Highland Wood due to roof leaks earlier this year is livid that her mother is not being compensated for the costs involved in driving to Lindsay up to four times a week to visit her husband.

However, Haliburton Highlands Health Services (HHHS) CEO Carolyn Plummer said they provided free, out-of-town, transportation to family members and pursued all avenues with their insurer to get other costs reimbursed, but were unsuccessful. Jennifer Wilson said her dad, Herbert Debes, was forced to relocate to Lindsay when the home was closed for roof repairs.

She said despite HHHS telling families at an initial meeting to keep their receipts, her mom was told last week that she would not be reimbursed.

Wilson said the entire family took turns driving to and from Lindsay but her mom, Sigrid, travelled several times a week.

She conceded HHHS did provide transportation at least once a week, and sometimes twice, but "that wasn't enough. My mom visits my dad almost every day.



She drove two, three, four times a week to Lindsay to be with my dad. That's a lot for an 80-year-old and a lot of use on her car."

Wilson said her mother spent more than \$350.

"With any normal insurance claim, like if your basement was flooded and you were displaced, that would all be covered ... your accommodation. These residents were paying full pop as if they were in their own home at Highland Wood."

Wilson said she was speaking out on behalf of her family, and other families, since the issue involves "the most vulnerable sector, the elderly.

"This has nothing to do with the care he received but with management and insurance and I believe I really do need to let people know. Others don't have a voice and are not financially able to swallow all these bills," Wilson said.

"You can't stress enough, this is our most vulnerable sector. How are we not protecting these people? Here my mom is 80 years old and was running the roads."

Plummer said during the evacuation, HHHS immediately made arrangements to provide support to families, including free transportation through Community Support Services and "a number of families accessed these supports."

She said families asked HHHS if additional transportation expenses could be reimbursed and HHHS agreed to work with families to see how HHHS might be able to support them.

"HHHS inquired with our insurance provider, but was informed that our policy would not cover such expenses. HHHS conducted an exhaustive search to determine if alternative funding sources or supports were available for families, but despite many conversations and inquiries in

the months since the temporary closure, HHHS has been unable to find any other funding sources," Plummer said.

She went on to say, "HHHS will continue to work hard to ensure that we remain in a good financial position, while dedicating as many resources as possible to direct resident, patient, and client care, so that we can provide the local healthcare and support services that our community depends on each and every day."

School support workers vote for strike action

A slew of non-teacher educators could be heading to the picket line at Haliburton County schools later this month.

Educational assistants (EAs), janitors, early childhood educators, secretaries, librarians, IT workers, maintenance, cafeteria, child and youth staff and speech language pathologists are all members of the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE) that is threatening to strike Sept. 30 if a deal cannot be reached with the province and local school boards.

Members of the local union, 997, voted overwhelmingly in favour of a motion for a strike mandate on Sept. 7 at Archie Stouffer Elementary School in Minden.

Local president William Campbell said they had almost twice as many members attend that vote as they did for a 2015 strike

He said custodial maintenance were 98.8 per cent in favour while office clerical. technical and EAs voted 97.4 per cent in agreement.

Across the province, the number was 93

Bargaining is continuing at the central level with CUPEs provincial bargaining team meeting this week with the Council of Trustees' Associations, the province and a mediator. Talks were continuing as of press time for this week's edition of *The* Hiahlander.

"We'll continue to do everything we can to avoid a labour disruption, but the strike vote results announced [Sept. 16] are a confirmation that CUPE members are ready to stand up for students, services and workers," the union said in a bargaining update to members.

The communique, jointly written by Ontario School Board Council of Unions or OSBCU president Laura Walton and CUPE Ontario School Board Coordinator Darcie McEathron encouraged members to continue talking to parents, families and community allies; "tell them that we are preparing for job action so that we can deliver the high-quality services that Ontario students deserve."

Earlier this year, the Trillium Lakelands District School Board (TLDSB) confirmed an overall reduction of 54.58 full time equivalent support staff positions.

TLDSB board chair Louise Clodd, in a statement to The Highlander yesterday, said, "We are continuing to monitor central negotiations. We have not been provided with any additional information about potential job action by CUPE, and for now, it is business as usual in our schools."

Council asked to keep Minden moving

The Communities in Action Committee wants Minden to continue to support more ways to get people moving.

Communities in Action presented to council at the Sept. 12 committee of the whole meeting. The committee spoke to active transportation like walking and biking, as well as how the municipality could support those things.

Member Sue Shikaze said supporting active transportation helps support vulnerable people who may not be able to

"It's important when we think about transportation, that we think beyond just driving," Shikaze said. "Transportation really is an equity issue."

The presentation featured instances of Minden improving active transportation, such as with redone downtown sidewalks and lowering speed limits in the village to 40 kilometres per hour. The active transportation committee recommended the municipality continue to improve pedestrian walkways, install bike racks and incorporate active transportation in its 2020 planning and budget process.

Council voted to receive the presentation as information.

Deputy mayor Lisa Schell said it was good to see how the township had improved but added that more needs to be done.

"We have a long way to go," Schell said. "But it's nice to see the before and after."

Museum gets unexpected boost

The Minden Hills Museum and Heritage Village is getting a chance for national recognition from the Canadian Conservation Institute (CCI).

The municipality was successful in an application to have CCI conduct an on-site facility assessment. The organization will examine the heritage of the locale and provide directional insight.

Economic Development, Destination and Marketing Officer Emily Stonehouse said normally, CCI focuses on larger establishments.

"This is something that kind of came out of the blue. It's an exciting opportunity," Stonehouse said.

Council provided pre-approval authorizing the mayor and clerk to proceed with an agreement with CCI. The consultation is expected in early October, with a report coming back to council by December.

"This does provide us with the opportunity to be recognized at the national level. It adds some legitimacy to our organization," Stonehouse said.

Minden debates insurance "red tape"

Minden Hills council remained at an impasse after a debate about how onerous the township's insurance requirements are for running events.

Staff presented a report on liability and Workplace Safety and Insurance Board (WSIB) insurance requirements during a committee of the whole meeting Sept. 12. The municipal events committee raised concerns that first-party insurance requirements are impeding event organizers.

Coun. Jennifer Hughey, who serves on the events committee, said this is giving the township a bad reputation.

"There are certain risks I feel we need to take to improve our reputation in the county for being a place where people can do things and there won't be as much red tape," Hughey said.

Hughey said the township's insurance requirements are causing vendors and artists to turn away, creating hurdles for organizers.

"Events in our community have not been as successful and I know there are many vendors who have chosen not to work in Minden anymore," Hughey told *The Highlander*.

Into the Blue Bakery is one of those vendors. Owner Janine Papadopoulos said after a lengthy back-and-forth this past summer trying to adhere to the township's specific insurance requirements, despite years of having her insurance in place, she opted to stop attending Minden events for now.

"I love going to Minden and I would continue to go to Minden. However, as a small business owner, it wasn't the easiest process," Papadopoulous said.

She added for years, the township has required more liability from her than neighbouring Haliburton townships. She's required \$5 million coverage in Minden, compared

to \$2 million elsewhere in Haliburton, which amounts to an additional \$250 per year.

Chief administrative officer Lorrie Blanchard spoke about how the municipality seeks proof of insurance from independent operators, contractors and service providers. When it comes to liability, Blanchard said the municipality generally seeks assurance by being named as an additionally insured on other people's policies.

Blanchard said the township could cover these independents under its own general liability coverage but their provider has advised against it.

"It's about council setting that level of risk," Blanchard said. "It's okay to take on that risk, it's just knowing you are taking on the risk."

Deputy mayor Lisa Schell said council should consider reducing insurance requirements for low-risk independents.

"I for one highly recommend those kinds of things that are obviously extremely low risk, in my opinion, that council would have a discussion," Schell said. "We're just pushing stuff away."

Not all vendors have minded the township's requirements. Boshkung Brewing event co-ordinator Kasara McKay said getting insurance for events in Minden is not an issue for them.

"It's a pain in the butt, anything bureaucratic is, but if you want to get it done, you do it," McKay said.

No motion came forward from the council discussion. Hughey said if nothing else, the township needs to be consistent and communicate. She recommended an information sheet be created to tell people about insurance requirements.


"We need to work together as an organization to make both pitching events and running events a little bit easier and a little bit more attractive."

Man charged with impaired driving in Haliburton

OPP arrested and charged a man with impaired driving after a collision in Dysart et al Sept. 12.

In a press release, police said emergency crews responded to the scene on County Road 21 shortly after 5 p.m. A van and a pickup truck were travelling in opposite directions when the truck crossed the center line and struck the passenger van.

"The driver of the van suffered non-life-threatening injuries," the press release said.

Police arrested the driver of the pickup truck on the scene.

The 32-year-old Dysart et al resident Jeremy Burk is charged with impaired driving and driving with more than 80mg blood alcohol level.

Burk is scheduled to appear in the Ontario Court of Justice in Minden Nov. 6.

Do you have the right stuff?

With the federal election about a month away, we've started our coverage by introducing you to the candidates in Haliburton-Kawartha-Lakes-Brock.

Last week, we profiled People's Party of Canada candidate Gene Balfour. Today, we have the NDPs Barbara Doyle. Next week, we'll bring you Liberal Judi Forbes, then Green candidate Elizabeth Fraser, followed by Conservative Incumbent Jamie Schmale.

We're also working on a Q and A ... pondering what we will ask these candidates that will provide real value to readers - not just provide a free platform for their, and their party's, propaganda.

It isn't easy. Politicians have always been good at dodging questions to get their speaking points across.

There was a good op-ed piece written by Jennifer Rubin in the Washington Post following the latest round of presidential candidate debates in the States. She wrote that her favourite question came at the end of the debate. "What's the most significant professional setback you've had to face? How did you recover from it? And what did you learn from it?"

Sure, it sounds a bit like a question you might be asked at a job interview. But, interview questions such as this speak to a candidate's character.

For example, we all know about Justin Trudeau's run-in with ethics commissions on things such as flying on the Aga Khan's private jet to his Caribbean island when Canada sends millions of dollars to his foundation. Unless we've been living under a rock, we also all know about the SNC Lavelin affair.

We could offer our local opposition candidates ink to criticize Trudeau but what real value is that to our readers? I think we would all agree Trudeau was very much in the wrong on both occasions. So, I would rather ask a question such as, "Describe something you've done in your work life that was ethically borderline? What were your feelings around that?"

Often with local federal election coverage, we see candidates simply parrot the party line and wonder if they have any original thoughts. Sometimes we don't vigorously question those platforms enough. For that very reason, another strong question would be something such as, "Which of your party's policies do you not agree with, and why?" Or perhaps, "Is there any issue that would make you cross the floor?" It's the type of question aimed at knocking the parrot off of the perch.

As Rubin rightly pointed out in her Post editorial, "voters honestly don't pick presidential candidates on the details of policy. They do, however, pick someone they trust, who understands their problems and who conveys empathy." Arguable it's the same **By Lisa Gervais** with Canadian politics.



So, we want to know who is up for the challenge locally? Not just for now, but for the future. Do they know the riding? Do they grasp what's important to local voters? Does their party's platform reflect our existing, and changing, values here in Haliburton County?

We know people here are worried about climate change. They're concerned about health care and long-term care beds. The economy is another key issue, as is how much they have to pay in taxes and what their retirement incomes are going to look

But they also want to know the character of those who would purport to represent

Young people hardly need moralizing from adults like me, even if supportive. Count this as an effort to amplify the message in whatever little way I can.

Climate change is as real a threat as ever. The science on this is settled. There is no debate on this to be had. The younger you are, the longer you stand to suffer because of this. Drastic, radical change is needed. It is incredible to see youth rise for this cause and it is a sight that is terrifying to old

Sadly, the world is not ready to fully embrace this movement. At a national level, people running for our federal office have

derided this movement and Greta Thunberg, the 16-year-old activist who kicked it off. There are people running in Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock who deny climate change or would like to ignore it, idiocy which cannot be tolerated.

Across the world and in Haliburton, there are those who upturn their noses at the protest. They charge parents they have never met with manipulating their children, as if young people have no minds of their own (or as if educating your children about climate change is something abhorrent).

To the youth, I suggest this: ignore them. Ignore those who refuse to heed your voice. Ignore them as you change the world.

But that change can be hard to see. At the end of the day, when you walk away from the protest, the world will likely still be spinning toward climate catastrophe. Gas-powered cars will still line the streets. Business will probably proceed as usual. It may seem like your voice has died in the same air you are defending.

In a world like that, it is all too easy to remain inert. You did not ask for this fight and it is not fair for progressively minded adults to expect it of you. Navigating this world is hard enough as it is. If you choose **By Joseph Quigley** to stay home, or in



class, no one has any right to blame you. It is not your sins which are destroying this Earth.

But I hope you keep fighting.

It will take a mile to gain an inch. The hands of old men grasp too tightly onto the world they have built to suit them. Real change often comes too slowly and is fueled by far too much blood, sweat and

But that world belongs to you. It is your right to reach out and take it from those who wish to destroy it.

I can only ask: fight on. Fight for tomorrow. Fight because change does come, even if beyond a horizon we can see. Fight like lives depend upon it because they do. Stay determined.



Standing together to Take Back the Night

When Bonnie Roe takes part in 'Take Back the Night' in Haliburton Sept. 19, she will dedicate her participation to Daisy Downs, a former staff member of the women's shelter in Minden who passed away earlier this year

The Haliburton Emergency Rural SafeSpace or HERS was near to Downs' heart and is also a cause Roe strongly believes in.

"Having been involved with Women's Emergency House in Haliburton in the

1990's and then continuing to work with a great group towards its rebirth, HERS, this issue is near and dear to my heart for many reasons." Roe said. "I had the privilege of walking with Daisy Downs, an invaluable YWCA HERS staff, and I personally dedicate this next Take Back the Night to her."

The Haliburton Take Back the Night event will be held on Thursday, with sign-making starting at 6 p.m., a rally at 7 p.m. and a candelight vigil and walk beginning at 7:30 p.m. at Head Lake Park.

Roe said Take Back the Night originated to enable women to come together to hold vigils and marches to promote awareness about the need for personal safety against domestic violence.

"I feel it has now expanded as an opportunity for everyone to come together to take a stand against violence towards any human being and promote awareness that violence affects us all, as a community," she said.

Roe said last year's experience "was very powerful. Women, men and children

showed support by sharing powerful poems, stories and creating posters expressing what the night meant to them. Walking through the town of Haliburton with candles, holding our signs high was hugely empowering. I was touched by the number of people in cars and on the street who stopped to observe and read our messages."

The night is being organized by The Kawartha Sexual Assault Centre, Fleming College and partner organizations. There'll be similar events in the City of Kawartha Lakes, Peterborough and Northumberland.

Dorset tower up for ICIP funding

Algonquin Highlands council has selected the Dorset Tower for its application under the Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program's (ICIP) community, culture and recreation stream.

The overall ICIP program will see up to \$30 billion in combined federal, provincial and other partner funding, under four priority areas. Municipalities and partners would pay 26.67 per cent. There's maximum funding of \$5 million per project.

Other staff options included: parking, boardwalks and a viewing platform at

Buttermilk Falls; rebuilding the Log Chute and developing the park; work at the Stanhope Firefighters' Community Hall; and the Oxtongue Lake Community Centre. If successful, Dorset Tower work would include landscaping, roadway upgrades, tower upgrades, development of a peak-aboo rock and other viewpoints, accessibility, pedestrian walkways etc.

The ICIP submission deadline is Nov. 12.

Spending efficiency money

Council discussed projects designed to

review services, find efficiencies and streamline processes at their Sept. 5 meeting. This is to meet the criteria of the one-time \$532,000 grant from the provincial government in March.

Treasurer Tammy McKelvey estimated the township will contribute \$18,750 towards the County of Haliburton-led service delivery review.

She said staff also suggested: demolition of the Dorset satellite office that is currently closed due to mold; digitizing all information contained in the property roll files; purchasing and implementing new software, including the financial and property tax components, as well as

Candidate profiles New Democratic Party - Barbara Doyle

Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock NDP candidate Barbara Doyle said her desire to run for office came out of personal experience with a system

she believes is broken. "We have programs that don't work or don't work well enough. We have justice issues. Going through it, the only way to effect change on a real level is to be on the inside,' Doyle said. "I realized I needed to step up

and work

towards becoming a member of Parliament."

The treasurer for the Olde Gaol Museum in Lindsay has also spent time as a social advocate. She co-chaired a coalition against a local hospital merger and worked on

a committee to improve domestic violence services.

As a survivor of domestic violence, Doyle said she has gone through the gaps in the justice system, particularly around family law.

"That's one of the things that really brought me to wanting to be in government,"

Doyle said. "The family law system is incredibly

broken in this country.

"This is my history.
I'm not ashamed of it. I was a victim but
I'm not a

anymore. I've come through the other side."

She added criticism for the Liberal government's family law update getting stuck in the senate in the last months of its term.

Doyle has a college education in legal studies. She joined the NDP because it closely aligned with her values and belief in programs like national pharamacare, a guaranteed basic income and a plan to build 500,000 affordable housing units over the next decade.

"It's not about the have or the have nots," Doyle said. "Everybody should have."

Doyle said health care, in particular, is very important to her and she believes

very important to her and she believes public health care should extend to include dental, vision, hearing and mental.

"We know this works. We know when people get access to their medications, it actually saves money and health care costs," Doyle said. "Health care should encompass the entire body, head to toe."

Despite running in a longtime Conservative stronghold, Doyle said she is confident about her chances as she feels voters are disappointed in both their provincial and federal representatives. "A lot of broken trust in this riding. A lot of things that have gone unanswered," Doyle said. "I'm getting incredible feedback on the ground, at doors and events. People are really supporting us."

You will not see any NDP lawn signs in Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock.

That's because Doyle has decided not to use them, citing environmental concerns given signs are single-use and end up in landfills.

Doyle said both her and her party are passionate about addressing climate change and she wanted to set a good example.

"I have to stand by what I'm talking about," Doyle said. "It is advertising how I will be in government. I will do what I will say I do."

The NDP has remained a distant third in polling so far but Doyle said she remains confident in her party's chances.

She added Canada has been stuck in a cycle between Liberal and Conservative governments.

"The NDP sometimes gets left out a little bit," Doyle said. "But NDP is a viable choice. We have a platform that works ... I'm actually very proud to stand with the NDP."

Haliburton Dance Academy expands for new season

4Cs celebrates 40 years of growth in Haliburton

The vision of Haliburton's churches to unite to better help people in need remains strong and in place after 40 years.

The Christian Community Concern Centre, knowns as the 4CS, celebrated its 40th anniversary at the Lily Ann Thrift Store Sept. 14. The organization recounted its history as dozens of patrons made their way through the doors to shop and show support.

Board chair David Ogilvie said it is remarkable how much the 4CS has grown over its four decades.

"Try to imagine, 40 years ago, a handful of ladies connected with the different churches in Haliburton started what is now the 4CS," Ogilvie said. "I can't imagine what they would think now to see what this has all turned into.

"It's the community that makes it happen, it's not us. It's all the people that donate."

The ministers of the local Anglican, United, Baptist and Full Gospel Lighthouse churches founded the 4CS in 1979. The ministers began offering counselling and providing some food gathered from donations, according to the organization.

Since then, the group has grown to run Haliburton's food bank, the Lily Ann Thrift Store and an array of other service programs, such as fire victim relief.

"It's wonderful that we've actually been in business this long," food bank manager Judy MacDuff said. "We're giving back to

the community."

Angela Haedicke has volunteered with the thrift store since it opened in 1985. She said the store, which raises money for the food bank, is valuable to the community and offers a friendly atmosphere.

"Everybody's very helpful and you can feel the spirit in here. It has something to do with sharing, giving and being there for each other," Haedicke said. "That makes it the best place."

Peter Markle said he has shopped there since it opened.

"This place has just risen its profile over the years and it's a valuable service to the town and to the cottagers," he said. "They fill a niche because they see what people want and they provide it." Ogilvie said the board's future vision is to find sustainable solutions so fewer people rely on the food bank. But he added the 4CS remains committed to providing food and support to the people who need it.

"Our desire is to eliminate the need for a food bank," Ogilvie said. "Sadly, that's probably not a reality."












Legion starts new vets decoration tradition

The Haliburton legion brought families and students together to honour the sacrifices of veterans with its first annual Veterans Decoration Day Sept. 16.

Branch 129 Haliburton invited veterans' families and Haliburton Highlands Secondary School (HHSS) students to St. Anthony Cemetery and Evergreen Cemetery. Attendees placed approximately 180 crosses on veterans' gravesites.

Public relations officer Linda Heeps said she is pleased by how the event went. She added it is important to recognize veterans through initiatives like this.

"We need to rethink about how lucky we are to live in a world that's free," Heeps said. "We have it all because of these people."

The legion hopes to make the new event an annual tradition. The day stems from Heeps work over two years creating a database for veterans buried in Haliburton. Through that, the legion plans to get federal funding to place new tombstones and refurbish old ones.

Heeps said other organizations donated to

support the event, including the Haliburton Legion's Ladies Auxiliary and the Haliburton and District Lions Club.

Sandra Oakley attended to place markers on the graves of her father, Russel Woodcock and uncle Neil Woodcock.

"It's great that they honour the veterans because we wouldn't have the country we have today if it wasn't for them," Oakley said. "I'm thankful to the people who have done all the work for this occasion."

The Haliburton legion partnered with the HHSS's leadership class last year to help with the research for the database. Teacher Paul Longo said it is important for students to make connections with their local community.

"It's a wonderful way for them to connect with our past here in the county," Longo said. "It really means something to them."

"It's really special that we were asked to be a part of it," student Sydney Churko said. "It's good for us as students to do something nice."

Heeps said the day was held in September to ensure students could be involved.

"I want them to know how important the veterans are."

He recorded an album on a Sovietera icebreaker, and played at David Suzuki and Jane Goodall's birthday parties. Now, Danny Michel is coming to Haliburton to perform at the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion.

His concert will kick off the Haliburton County Folk Society 2019-2020 season Friday, Sept. 20 at 8 p.m.

Society spokeswoman Sue Shikaze said Michel is an amazing performer, and it will be a great show.

"Danny Michel is a multitalented singer, songwriter, producer and filmmaker. He is an artist who defies genres and whose music has influences of rock, pop, folk, world and even classical," she said.

Three documents everyone needs

With a will, power of attorney and personal care directive, you're ready for anything

Nobody likes to spend much time thinking about death or becoming disabled. But the consequences of putting planning off until it's too late can be severe for you and your family.

WILLS

Let's start by looking at wills. As most people are aware, the primary purpose of a will is to distribute your assets according to your wishes when you die. Promises you make verbally or even in writing may not be effective; you may wish to leave money to charity or specific items to people you love. A will ensures all of this happens without unnecessary costs and aggravation for your beneficiaries.

When you work with a professional, making a will also becomes an opportunity to do some important tax and succession planning. Spouses will usually want to ensure title to their home, and possibly other properties, is registered as a joint tenancy, so that when one spouse dies the other automatically becomes the sole owner. Often it also makes sense to name each other as beneficiaries for registered accounts like RSPs and TFSAs,

again to ensure a simple, tax-optimized transfer when one partner dies.

In other cases, for example second marriages where the intention is to leave each spouse's assets to their own children rather than to the other spouse, tenancy in common may be more appropriate. Business owners can set up structures to make succession smoother and more predictable.

The point is to arrange your affairs so your estate pays the least amount of tax, your wishes are respected, and conflicts between your beneficiaries are avoided; some advance planning can make a huge difference.

POWER OF ATTORNEY

This document allows someone else to sign your name for all kinds of purposes, in case you're not able to do your banking, pay bills or sell your property when you need to. It's not just for when you're infirm – a power of attorney can be used if you're on an extended vacation or otherwise unavailable. It can be restricted to allow the person you name as attorney to do only certain things, for example manage a single bank account.

It can also be restricted to certain time frames, for example while you are out of the country.

People usually make powers of attorneys so that, if they become incapable of managing their affairs — through illness, mental incompetence or otherwise — someone else can do it for them. The critical element is this: once you are no longer mentally competent you cannot make a power of attorney. It's too late, and your family will either have to manage without one or someone will have to apply to the province for guardianship.

PERSONAL CARE DIRECTIVE

This is similar to a power of attorney, but instead of dealing with your property it comes into effect when you are unable to make decisions about your own healthcare. It too can be restricted to certain time frames and activities, and just like powers of attorney, cannot be made once you are no longer mentally competent. The personal care directive allows you to name someone who will be empowered to make decisions on your behalf, and to specifically set out what

kinds of decisions you would like them

Many people have strong opinions as to what kind of care they'd prefer – everything from living accommodations to end-of-life decisions. A personal care directive is crucial if you want to ensure your wishes are respected and that someone you trust is able to make decisions on your behalf.

Having the right paperwork provides tremendous peace of mind that your wishes will be respected if you ever become incapable of making decisions, or if you die. Many people find the process a relief – we may not know how the future will unfold, but we can plan for it nevertheless. If you'd like to be sure you and your family are prepared, I'd be pleased to help you put your personal plans together.
