Friends are rallying to support a Minden family whose home was destroyed in a blaze Aug. 5.

Minden and Dysart firefighters responded to the home of Sharon and Rob Luke at Tilley Trail. They were unable to save the home, which was fully engulfed in the fire.

The cause of the fire remains unknown. Family friend Jesse Lynn West has started a GoFundMe to help the family. Minden Home Hardware, where Rob Luke works.

West said. "They just do so much for anyone in need. It's our turn to help them."

Minden Hills fire chief Mike Bekking said the homeowner was on the property at the time. He said paramedics took one person to hospital due to minor smoke inhalation

More than 20 firefighters responded to the call, which began around 3:30 p.m.

"The structure was fully involved," Bekking said. "The guys isolated the fire, contained it to the structure and we stopped it from spreading to a grass fire or a forest fire."

There was no saving the home, Bekking said, but firefighters were successful in containment. The Algonquin Highlands fire department also helped by covering another call at the time.

"The teamwork between the different fire departments was outstanding as usual," Bekking said. "Our guys did as much as they could."

Firefighters were on scene for several hours to manage hotspots and investigate.

Before the probe, Bekking said the fire seems to have started from the garage. He further said it is unlikely the cause will be found.

"Just because of the total loss," Bekking said. "This is the hardest part of the fire."

Braydin Hollows recently woke up to pages of Bell documents all over his front lawn.

Hollows, who lives along County Road 21 just outside of Minden, was perplexed and miffed that he had to pick up the litter.

He wondered if there'd been an accident involving a Bell vehicle overnight even though he had not heard anything.

With no one from Bell coming to clean things up, Hollows gathered the paperwork and took it inside. He was surprised to find confidential

information, including customers' names and phone numbers, account numbers, smart ID card information, invoices and customer signatures.

"Just pages all over my front lawn," Hollows said.

The Highlander asked Bell on July 16 if there'd been an accident. A spokesperson replied he'd checked with Bell's fleet team and no accident had been reported in Haliburton County around that time.

The paper then reached out to OPP to ask about any reports of a Bell truck involved in an accident Saturday night or early Sunday morning of July 13-14.

Station commander Liane Spong-Hooyenga replied there had been an incident at 9:51 p.m. the night of July 13, at 1145 Rice Rd. in Minden. She said the driver of a Bell truck that was parked in a driveway thought he'd left the vehicle in park but it wasn't and rolled over a septic bed into a tree. The driver was not in the

vehicle at the time. She said no charges had

When told of the police report, and that confidential paperwork was scattered across a residential lawn, the Bell spokesperson replied, "Oh no. Would you be able to

> provide me with the resident's contact info so our security team can contact them?'

The Highlander contacted Hollows, who consented to having his contact details shared.

Hollows told The Highlander on Aug. 1 that a Bell employee had contacted him. He said he came to get the paperwork, telling him that the

papers had flown off a truck. He said the employee gave him \$20 for his troubles. He further said he was then contacted by the Bell support team and given a month of free internet.

"It is definitely not normal," Hollows said. "If he had lost it, he would have come back looking for it."

A Bell spokesman replied Aug. 2 that one of their installation contractors was involved in a minor accident with his truck while completing an installation at the home across the road from Hollows' house.

"Unfortunately, while the truck was being towed, the contractor accidentally left his work orders behind. He later returned to pick them up, but he couldn't locate them. We contacted Mr. Hollows to make arrangements to retrieve them and let him know we appreciated the help."

The spokesman said they were contacting the 20 customers on the work orders to let them know what happened.

## Dysart's playgrounds put smiles on families' faces

Children at Eagle Lake Beach and West Guilford have new playgrounds to explore thanks to Dysart et al and the Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF).

The municipality celebrated the completed installation of the new playground equipment Aug. 1. Eagle Lake Beach playground was almost entirely redone with new equipment, while the West Guilford Community Centre got a new disc swing and tetra climber. The OTF largely funded the installations through an \$86,500 grant.

Recreation program co-ordinator Andrea Mueller said the playgrounds needed the items, especially at Eagle Lake Beach.

"Pretty much everything needed to be replaced. It was old, it was falling apart, it wasn't safe," Mueller said. "We needed to put in a few items here to bring it up to standards."

Eagle Lake Beach also got new washrooms, including an accessible one. At West Guilford, Mueller said the aim was to make the playground better for all

"It was adding in those extra elements to make it attractive," Mueller said. "They say 5-12 years old but a 12-year-old doesn't really want to go down a tiny little slide."

The municipality finished he Eagle Lake Beach playground at the end of May, while the new West Guilford equipment was completed July 30.

The funding was originally confirmed in early 2018. Mueller said there were delays such as weather and a fire at the factory which produced the equipment.

"We had hoped to have it finished sooner," she said. "But the parks staff have worked extremely hard and put in a lot of hours, a lot of sweat equity, especially for the last few weeks."

Eagle Lake resident Allan Bagg helped develop the beach. He attended the opening and complimented the municipality on the work.

"It's come a long way," Bagg said. "I have to commend the municipality for this, it's fantastic."

Dysart et al parks and recreation worker Ryan Akey said children have already enjoyed the new ways to play at the beach.

"We finished it and came outside and were all just packing up, ready to drive away and the camp kids came outside," Akey said. "They were all over it instantly."

Mueller said the municipality wants to continue to improve its playgrounds.

"It's just trying to make sure we stay up to date and current," she said.



### Resident wants shortcut to Minden better promoted

A former owner of the Red Umbrella Inn thinks Minden Hills needs to fix up Bobcaygeon Road and make it a gateway from Highway 118 W into the village.

Doug Macnab wrote a letter to the township, which was tabled at its last council meeting.

He joked about the competition between Muskoka and The Haliburton Highlands, with Haliburton considered "the poor cousin."

The long-time resident and property owner, said "the 118 from Bracebridge to Carnarvon is the main artery that connects the two counties. For people travelling in both directions, the Bobcaygeon Road could be an enticing shortcut that leads right through our town.

"As we know, once you turn onto the Bobcaygeon Road south from Highway 118 you are going to get funnelled right into downtown Minden. The bridge in town over the Gull River makes Minden a very attractive community and is far too easy to bypass."

He said many people don't know they can cut down Bobcaygeon Road to downtown Minden and instead travel the Highway 35 corridor and often drive right through without ever visiting Minden's historic downtown.

"I believe Minden is missing an

outstanding opportunity to utilize the Bobcaygeon Road as the gateway to the Highlands," Macnab said.

He added one of the obstacles is nonexistent signage advertising the short cut to downtown Minden. Another is the condition of the road, which is potholed.

"All travellers from the Muskokas would see it first and if it was properly signed, I am confident a great deal of traffic could be diverted through the downtown core, increasing exposure for all the things we have to offer," Macnab wrote.

"My suggestion is to get serious planning on a full and proper paving job complete with bike lanes of the entire Bobcaygeon Road. Rebuilding the Bobcaygeon Road will also prepare this important route for the development that it is currently experiencing and encourage increased cottage traffic from local lakes such as Brady, Kushog and the west side of Boshkung to travel through downtown Minden."

Mcnab added the benefits would extend to merchants in the downtown core; the County of Haliburton from an enhanced first impression; travellers from Muskoka coming across the 118; businesses relying on a good first impression; seasonal residents from the north and west who would use the route regularly if it was paved properly; people travelling west on the 118 and local residents who use the Bobcaygeon Road.



## Former arts college getting demolished "No problem with that," founder says

Carole Finn said it does not bother her seeing the demolition of the former home to the art school she helped found.

Workers have begun tearing down the building at 1 Sunnyside St., which once housed what is today known as Haliburton School of Arts and Design. Garden Retirement Developments Inc. plans to build a new 74-unit seniors residence on the property.

The building housed the college for many of its formative years, between the 1970s and 90s. But it has sat unused since the school moved to its current location at College Drive in 2004. Finn said she has fond memories of the old building but is fine with what is happening.

"The village has to move on,"
Finn said. "The village is growing
and certainly, the school grew with
the village. It changed, the property
changed and now it's got another use."

The college did not start out in that structure, known as the Lakeview Centre. The school began around 1967, with a group of people teaching classes out of cottages and other assorted buildings.

The Lakeview Centre previously

housed the township elementary school. But when the school board bought a property and moved that elsewhere in 1972, the centre was open for the college to move in.

"We had no home," Finn said.

The arts college moved into the front part of the Lakeview Centre. There it grew, attracting hundreds of students. Arts groups would use the structure for the winter months, while the college would operate more classes in the summer.

There was a lot of camaraderie amongst artists at the time, Finn said.

"The college was really the conduit for all the local artists to grow. That was where they met," Finn said. "It was just a real family of people."

But the Lakeview Centre was an ageing building and was hard to maintain, Finn said. She served on the college's board of governors from 1982-1989 and said she fought to get investment in the building.

"Keeping up an old building was a huge expense for the college," she said. "There wasn't the political will to keep arts funded."

But the school was helped when community came together to build the current new campus, Finn said.

Now, the Sunnyside Street property

is ready for a new purpose.

"It's good that it's still there to be used for the needs of the community. At the time it was a school, it did a tremendous thing for the growth of the community," Finn said. "Same thing now. We need places for seniors to go."

#### Project stuck in limbo

The property still remains in legal limbo due to a holding provision, stemming from an Ontario Municipal Board ruling. Although the developer has a demolition and site-servicing permit, they cannot build there yet.

Garden Retirement Developments
Inc. approached Dysart et al council
July 23 to address the situation. The
municipality can lift the holding
provision, but only when certain
planning requirements are met.
Although no resolution was found
at the time, staff and councillors
expressed a desire to keep working to
ensure the project proceeds.

Municipal manager of planning Sue Harrison said that work continues.


"Staff are working diligently with the developer to keep the project moving forward in a timely manner," Harrison said.

### Silo mentalities prevail

We have to wonder if it's possible for the County of Haliburton and its four lower-tier municipalities to actually find efficiencies when they continue to operate with silo mentalities.

We were troubled to learn that the Township of Minden Hills is now negotiating with an out-of-town website developer to create its own destination and tourism website.

We're left scratching our heads since taxpayers are already contributing to a tourism department at the County of Haliburton and the \$100,000-plus salary of its director.

Of course, some out there might also be questioning why Minden Hills has an economic development, destination and marketing officer in the first place, when, presumably, that's what the county director should be doing - at least the destination and marketing part.

We acknowledge the economic development aspect of the job is different and stems from a belief by some that the county isn't doing a good job when it comes to economic development. County councillors could have created a joint physician recruitment and economic development position during this year's budget but some chose to go with physician recruitment alone.

We don't take issue with the employees involved. However, we do think the

politicians that put them there have to consider if this set-up is in the best interests of taxpayers.

But, first, let's get to where this started. There was initially a joint Request for Proposal (RFP) between the county, the Municipality of Highlands East and Minden Hills for the creation and implementation of new website designs.

Algonquin Highlands and Dysart et al were not involved by choice. Dysart hasn't made any recent overhauls, although they may do so next year, and Algonquin Highlands has maintained its status quo.

The county led the initiative on behalf of Minden Hills and Highlands East, looking for consistency, potential savings and the desire to attract professional applicants for the three large-scale projects (this from a report by the economic development, destination and marketing officer of Minden Hills).


The county and HE were apparently looking for upgrades. Minden Hills wanted a destination/tourism-based website. Minden had an additional section built into the scoring system, looking for experience for their specific needs.

The three parties shortlisted two firms but in the end, the county and Highlands East went one way and the Township of Minden Hills another.

Minden Hills went with Sandbox at a cost of \$22,264.71 plus HST; licensing

of \$2,474.88 a year; website hosting of \$300 a year and HST plus annual monthly maintenance and support of \$5,520 a year and HST.

Minden Hills would argue it came down to cost for them and their choice is cheaper for them. They'd argue they were looking for a site to highlight Minden-specific events, experiences and services, so it won't be just a tourism website.

That may be true but there are still questions to be posed about consistency and potential savings. It appears that all four municipalities and the County of Haliburton continue to follow their own paths for marketing and tourism, with no talk of combined strategies and consistent messaging, which could lead to cost savings. Sure we have #MyHaliburtonHighlands but now we've also got Mind on Minden.

As for economic development, it would seem Minden Hills has a strategy but it's not apparent to us that there's any plans for a shared vision with the County of Haliburton, Dysart et al, Algonquin Highlands, or Highlands East.

#### **EleXion Files**

Concerned Citizens of Haliburton County (CCHC) is pleased to present, EleXion Files, August to early October, 2019. We will be submitting a series of articles focusing on nonpartisan information about the federal election. Articles will include: the right and privilege of voting, informed voting, minority governments, taxes, engaging the youth vote and responses to several key federal election issues.

#### What is CCHC?

We are a group of concerned citizens who came together to express our concerns as a collective voice, to make a difference in our community. We meet monthly with 15 active members, and 50 plus keen to be informed of our activities. Our goals are: Identify and promote awareness about issues of concern that affect our community, undertake actions that are realistic and achievable, engage the public, businesses, municipalities and the media in dialogue and collaborate with organizations to avoid duplication.

#### Our four concerns:

The environment – climate change inaction and mitigation.

Reducing single use plastics and packaging.

Social justice – cuts to programs, Basic Income Pilot Project and minimum wage Accountability of our elected

representatives
Youth engagement

## 1. Environment – climate change inaction and mitigation

In February, we created a plastic water bottle working group, with the intent to take a delegation to our municipal councils,

requesting plastic water bottles no longer be purchased, used by staff or at municipal events. We met with Ray Letheren and team, from the Blue Bayfield Group, to learn about their experiences. This action was put on hold when Haliburton County Council created a Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation Plan. We initiated a single use plastics campaign to approach businesses about this issue. We wrote a letter to the Haliburton BIA and have been approaching businesses in our community, to learn their successes and challenges. Visits have been well received. We are hoping to partner with students from the high school and our local grocery stores to have an information table to promote alternatives.

## 2. Accountability of our elected representatives

Members met with Laurie Scott, MPP, in April and Jamie Schmale MP, in June. We expressed our concerns on the impact of the drastic cutbacks to: health care, education, carbon tax, climate action solutions, libraries, EMS and more. We emphasized that their constituents need to feel our voices are being heard and see they are working on behalf of all citizens in their riding. On April 23, we organized a respectful community demonstration outside the chamber of commerce meeting in Haliburton which was attended by Scott. Our goal was to bring attention to harmful cuts made by our current government.

We initiated a letter writing campaign to the editors of the papers regarding these issues which has been a resounding success.

#### 3. Social justice

CCHC supports an improved quality of life for citizens through initiatives such as increasing the minimum wage and the classaction lawsuit to reinstate the Basic Income Pilot Project (BIPP). We hope to partner this fall with Haliburton International Film Festival and FoodNet to bring, 'The Manitoba Story' to Haliburton County. This documentary by Evelyn Forget, tells the story of the BIPP in Dauphin, Manitoba.

#### 4. Youth Engagement

On four Fridays in March and April, 20-30 adults supported Jürgen Shantz, home schooled children and several JDH students in the Student Strike for Climate Action held in front of the Dysart municipal building. Adults and all ages are encouraged to join Jürgen in the Global Strike, September 20, to take a stand for our youth against climate inaction. A CCHC member and friend of David Suzuki, has informed David of Jürgen's leadership in Fridays for Future. We look forward to this exciting connection.

## Highlands East cracking down on messy properties

Highlands East council narrowly passed a new clean and clear bylaw July 23 which aims to help address messy properties and clarify waste standards.

The new bylaw is an update to one from 2004. It changes the definitions of what refuse is disallowed on yards. The municipality can also now dish out penalties without going through the court systems by using notices.

In a May staff report, bylaw enforcement officer Wayne Galloway said the bylaw has been worked on since September 2018 due to issues enforcing the old one.

"After several attempts to work within the confines of the bylaw, it was decided that it would be better to draft an entirely new bylaw," Galloway said. "There have been several complaints in regards to various properties within the municipality not conforming to the Clean and Clear bylaw." The new bylaw allows the municipality to clean up a property itself, should a notice not be adhered to. In that case, any costs associated can be added to tax rolls, Galloway said.

The new bylaw also narrows the definitions of waste disallowed on property. Galloway said the 2004 bylaw's definitions were so broad, that every property could be found in violation.

But the bylaw did not pass cleanly. In a recorded vote, Deputy mayor Cec Ryall and Coun. Cam McKenzie voted against it, while Mayor Dave Burton, Coun. Ruth Strong and Coun. Suzanne Partridge voted in favour.

The bylaw forbids the presence of any refuse in any yards, which includes garbage, construction materials, appliances, furniture, derelict vehicles and discarded boats. Weeds and grass are also to be limited to 20 cm and under, but exceptions are made for naturalized areas like shorelines and agricultural.


McKenzie said he voted against due to a clause on road allowances. The bylaw makes an exception for road allowances, meaning grass on them can be longer than 20 cm.

McKenzie referred to Cardiff and Bicroft Heights. He said road allowances there have been maintained by residents for more than 50 years and it's become "next to impossible to tell where the road allowance ends and the actual privately-owned lawn begins.

"This new bylaw states that these road allowances will no longer need to be maintained by anyone," McKenzie said in a prepared statement at council. "The impact on our small community could change its appearance greatly. The front half of the properties could be allowed to turn into hay fields and weed patches."

Violators of the bylaw also face potential fines up to \$5,000, which remains unchanged from the 2004 version.

## Can I Swap Expensive Appliances?

Let's say you spent a bundle on a gourmet kitchen with top-of-the-line appliances. Can you switch one or more of them for cheaper models before closing? You already know the answer, but here it is in black and white: no. If 'appliances' were included in the agreement, even if it didn't specify makes and models, they are the ones your buyer saw and they are what your buyer gets.

You'll see references in the agreement to 'fixtures' and 'chattels'. Fixtures are things that are stuck to the structure, like a toilet, water pump and ceiling lighting. Chattels are things that are movable like furniture, appliances, artwork and canoes. Fixtures are generally included by default; chattels are generally excluded. If you want to keep a fixture, or a specific chattel when others are part of the sale, make sure you list these in the agreement. Otherwise, you've sold those specific items with the property.

## Drag show coming to Minden Pride

While the night shows grab the Forest Festival limelight, manager Lesley English said Saturday and Sunday afternoons are always fantastic additions to the highlypopular annual event.

Sue Shikaze, an artistic director for the Haliburton County Folk Society, said the concert series is trying to broaden how people see the folk music genre.

Details of the 2019/2020 season were released Aug. 1 and committee members are excited about this year's lineup.

"It's not always one person standing up at the mic with a guitar, singing songs," said Shikaze. "It (folk music) really encompasses all different genres and I think our lineup for next year really focuses on that."

The concert series consists of: Danny Michel performing at the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion on September 20; Irish Mythen on November 9 at the Highland Hills United Church; local band Homemade Stew at the Northern Lights Feb. 1, 2020, My Son the Hurricane at the Haliburton Legion on April. 18, 2020 and Big Little Lions May 3, 2020 at a location still being determined.

Shikaze said the artists and bands are chosen by the concert committee. Members make suggestions and pick their top favourites. The committee then tries to book them.

Recently, the folk society has been trying to choose artists and bands that are not only different but will attract a diverse group of people.

"The folk society made a very conscious decision a few years ago to increase diversity in our audience especially," said committee member Walter Tose. "In that vein we've increased diversity both on what we offer and where we offer it. A few years ago, all of our venues were sitdown venues ... last year we did the legion for the first time and half of it was a dance floor and that was a sellout for us."

Last year's series had three concerts sell out and the other two had a large crowd, according to Shikaze.

Tickets for this year can be bought online at haliburtonfolk.com or at On the Spot variety in Minden or Halco Electronics in Haliburton.

Prices for individual concerts are \$25 for non-members and \$20 for members. My Son the Hurricane tickets are \$35 for non-members and \$30 for members.

Series tickets are 60 per cent sold out according to the committee but cost \$110 for non-members and \$85 for members.

The Haliburton County Folk Society is also looking for hosts for their Homeroots Concert series. Volunteers would have to be open to the idea of hosting a musician for a night and allowing them to hold a small concert (approximately 30-40 people) in their home.

This is the sixth book of poetry Smith has published, his first being a collection called *Spokes* published in the 1980's.


Smith joked about how his next steps in his writing career would be to bring him straight to the grave, very fitting considering the theme of the poems.

"I learned so much about Indigenous people and culture," Martin said.

"After all, it is the younger generation who are going to have to 'pick up the torch' for the Land Trust in the future."

The Rock our World fundraising dance was started last year as a replacement for the gala that had been held for 10 years.

The evening's goal was to bring in more money for the organization's stewardship fund.

"It's used to help finance our day-to-

Last year's dance sold 110 tickets and raised \$10,200 and gained three new members. This year, the Land Trust is hoping to sell 130 tickets, gain five members and raise \$12,000.

Gerstl said the community supports the Land Trust because they understand the importance of donated properties and the endangered species they house.

"The properties that were donated were donated to our community, for their

enjoyment and for future generations to enjoy," said Gerstl. "They understand that the people who donated the properties were and are long-time residents and early settlers of the area who nurtured and loved the land enough to want it conserved."

The dance will feature a silent and live auction, 50/50 draw, door prizes, food and live music from Jamie Williams.

"This year, we have Raptors tickets, Toronto Maple Leaf tickets (both sets coming with a hotel stay in Toronto), jewelry, a fabulous hand-made basket that incorporates deer antlers, and a funky hall table made from an 'old forest' tree," she said.

The Haliburton Highlands Outdoors Association (HHOA) Outdoors for Youth Club (O4Y) has launched the Explore Kits for Kids loan program through Haliburton County Public Libraries this week.

The packs are now available at the Haliburton and Minden branches, with five packs per branch.

In 2018, the HHOA and CARP Haliburton successfully obtained funding from the New Horizons for Seniors program to build a mobile classroom and launch the HHOA O4Y Club.

"The HHOA and CARP hold a joint interest in seniors teaching youth and youth teaching seniors—the transfer of knowledge between all ages with the outdoors being the venue and with nature providing the teaching tools," said Rebecca Krawczyk.

The Explore Kits for Kids are backpacks, containing an array of citizen science tools and are an extension of the HHOA O4Y

mobile classroom which can travel to any venue, such as local schools, libraries, trade shows, special events, and even next to wetlands.

The kits are available for loan from HCPL and Lake of Bays Public Library branches so families can take them out to nature to practice citizen science and explore the outdoors.

Content for the kits was provided through funding from not just New Horizons for Seniors, but also donations from The Land Between's Turtle Guardians program, Haliburton Foodland, and Glecoff's Family Store.

## The best start for your construction project

Your local building supply centre can be your best connection for saving time, money and frustration during your new build or renovation.

Emmerson Lumber Limited, with locations in Haliburton and Carnarvon, is an excellent example.

Like many rural building supply centres, Emmerson Lumber is a shareholder in a national cooperative buying group, in this case Castle Building Centres Group Limited. Group members can offer volume pricing that's more competitive with prices at urban "big box" stores. But rural centres have an even bigger advantage, according to Emmerson Lumber owner Kim Emmerson.

When big box stores arrived in Canada, the thought was that it would be the end of traditional building supply businesses, said Emmerson in a recent interview.

"As it's turned out, that has not been the case. They've actually increased sales."

Rural centres can offer greater customer service by way of "personal attention, quick deliveries, knowledgeable staff, convenience," said Emmerson. "These are things that it's hard for a big box to offer."

That service advantage has contributed to customer loyalty that spans generations.

"We've had numerous occasions where people have built a cottage with us, say back in the '70s or '80s, and their children were part of that, and now ... the second generation has come in and bought a cottage from us," said Emmerson.

Emmerson Lumber's Haliburton site began life as a sawmill and grist mill on the Drag River rapids, part of the original Mill Reserve created during the development of Haliburton Village in the 1860s. Kim's father, William "Bill" Emmerson, purchased the business assets in 1959 with his brotherin-law Dr. Lloyd Bailey, son of then-owner W.O. Bailey. Current owner Kim acquired the similarly historic Carnarvon mill site four years ago.

Over time, Emmerson Lumber's services expanded to incorporate home and cottage design from start to finish. It now staffs five designers, three of whom are certified, and they turn customers' ideas into formal designs. The company has established a planning group for new projects and there's always one planner on site during regular opening hours, said Emmerson.

Emmerson Lumber also offers kitchen design, flooring, and decks and docks. Other services include an equipment rental department and an extensive website that features a product catalogue, referrals to local contractors and more.

Emmerson said a good percentage of newbuild customers are constructing cottages and live outside the region. With the ease

## Riding the rails down to the waterfront

### Inclined elevators connect cottages to lakes

Nestled at a cottage on top of a steep hill lays a mass of metal fashioned into a track plunging towards a lake.

Peering down from atop a lift makes it resemble a rollercoaster. But riding down to the waterfront at Drag Lake is slow, steady and minimizes the sense of a plunge.

The 346-foot structure is Dysart et al's first built by Inclined Elevation, which gives hillside cottages a way to directly access the water. The \$200,000 device was completed last month at 2016 Blueberry Line, which is for sale and had an open house July 10-11.

Inclined Elevation president Dr.John Weinstein said his work building the elevators makes a major difference.

"These people had to go load a fourwheel-drive vehicle, drive out and down this really dangerous road to get to the water," Weinstein said. "Now, it's a fourminute ride and it's totally safe."

Weinstein has built more than 80 lifts since 2003, scattered across cottage country including Muskoka, Kawartha Lakes, Huntsville and Quebec.

The theoretical particle physicist said there are difficulties to overcome when designing a lift such as this.





"How do you pick this route? How do you find where to go?" Weinstein said. "There's lots and lots of challenges."

But the man said he relishes that.

"It's so much fun. I have to think. I have to solve problems. Not the kind of problems I did as a physicist, but similar."

The lift is a value-added proposition for the property, listed at \$3,999,000. Realtor Chilla Riddle said the elevator is a fun ride.

"It's nice and smooth and you see everything. It complements the surroundings."

The lift required a variance from

Dysart et al to build. Weinstein said the structures are largely unregulated, but designed and engineered with safety in mind.

"We're only unregulated if we don't have an accident," Weinstein said.
"We check every nook and cranny ... because we love being unregulated. We don't have to follow rules that other people, bureaucrats have set out."

To date, no accidents involving the lifts have occurred, he added.

Although it is a first for Dysart, this is not the first in Haliburton County. Jim Carnegie had one built at his

cottage in Minden in 2010.

Carnegie said his wife has a disability. He added the lift has allowed them to go from two or three waterfront trips per year to more than 20

"If it wasn't for that, we probably wouldn't have a cottage," Carnegie said. "Had zero problems with it and it was exactly what he promised it would be."

"It transforms people's lives," Weinstein said. "It's a really neat thing to be able to do."





## Wired for sound and much more with automation

Universal design is increasingly popular in new construction and renovations, and especially important in Haliburton County as our retiree population grows.

According to the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC), the philosophy of universal design is that our dwellings should be comfortable, pleasant, safe and usable by everyone in our family, regardless of age or ability. This accessible design concept includes the option to age in place, enjoying our forever homes and cottages as long as possible.

Accessible design through home automation can extend the life and usability of a dwelling for people with different and changing abilities. The CMHC notes that "smart" home technology has emerged in the last 20 years to offer extended functionalities and greater benefits to people with physical, sensory and cognitive disabilities, allowing them to live more independently.

Automation can also improve your safety, make it easier to communicate with your family, save you time and effort, increase your home's energy efficiency, allow you to monitor your home while you are away, and more.

Home automation systems can be installed during new construction or placed in an existing home without extensive rewiring. The CMHC advises hiring an electrician to install more complex networks and integrate multiple hard-wired devices. However, some devices simply plug into existing electrical outlets so you can install them yourself.

When considering a home automation system, it's important to review several factors beyond functionality and cost. These include system requirements (for example, electrical needs or the need for a dedicated computer to operate more complex systems). If you're installing systems from different companies, you'll need to check on compatibility.

Think about how portable you need the control device to be. You'll need to plan the location of your computers, control devices and telephones for easy access and full control. Safety systems should have a backup power source such as a generator. If your main electrical panel is in the basement, consider moving it to the garage and installing it at a wheelchair-accessible height.

The CMHC recommends consulting with a systems integration contractor and a professional who specializes in accessible design, such as an occupational therapist, architect or interior designer, to determine the best system and layout for your needs.







### Lift your entertainment game

In the warm summer months, there's nothing better than having friends or family over for a fun backyard party or outdoor barbecue.

But there's an art to throwing a great party, and if you don't keep your guests properly entertained, they might not stick around for long.

Whether you have a huge yard or a tiny patio, here are three ways to level up your outdoor entertainment game and keep your guests happy this summer.

#### Giant games

Your guests will undoubtedly be entertained by watching or playing a massive version of popular childhood games, such as Jenga or Connect Four. Try Jenga Giant. Just like with the tiny version, the goal is to remove and add blocks without knocking over the whole thing. Everyone will be on their toes, watching to see when it will tumble.

#### Outdoor bar with cooler

A traditional cooler does the trick if you just need your drinks chilled. But step up your game with a nice outdoor



bar that expands to reveal a spot to add ice and cool your beverages. It's also great for setting out ingredients for fun mixed drinks.

#### Camouflaged speaker

Playing great music can change the entire atmosphere of a gathering. A weatherproof speaker, which is camouflaged as a rock, looks like part of your landscaping and can provide a soundtrack to your parties regardless of the weather. (Submitted by Linda Baumgartner)

#### 10 tips to help you keep cool while conserving energy:

#### 1. Set to save

Set your thermostat to 25°C when you're home and 28°C when you're out. For every degree you dial up the temperature, you use about three to five per cent less energy. Or, get a programmable thermostat, then set it and forget it.

#### 2. Draw the drapes

Draw the curtains every morning to keep out the heat. Blackout curtains, blinds, window film, awnings and other coverings greatly reduce solar heat gain and save your air conditioner (A/C) from working harder to maintain temperature.

#### 3. Invest in a fan

Consider a ceiling fan: it lets you keep your thermostat 4°C higher without affecting your comfort. Set the blades counter-clockwise for a downward cooling breeze. The best angle for maximum cooling is 12 to 16 degrees.

#### 4. Cut the humidity

Humidity makes it feel hotter than it is – the "feels like" temperature measures both relative humidity and air temperature combined. Keep your A/C running to reduce humidity, and use exhaust fans in kitchens and baths to expel humid air.

#### 5. Seal it in

Blasting your A/C is an inefficient way to cool a drafty home. Inspect windows, doors and vents to spot areas where cool air can escape and hot air can seep in, then use caulking and weather-stripping to seal the leaks.

#### 6. Move the air

Get the air circulating – especially if you don't have A/C. Create a cross-breeze by opening windows on opposite sides of your home. If you have multiple storeys, open windows on upper and lower levels.

#### 7. Power down

Plug your electronics into a power bar with a timer, and turn it off during on-peak and mid-peak hours – see how electricity prices change based on Time-of-Use. Keeping devices plugged in all day draws power, even when they're off.

#### 8. Cool your kitchen

When cooking, opt for smaller appliances like crock pots, toaster ovens and microwaves. Ovens use more electricity and raise the temperature, forcing your cooling system to work double-time. Or head outdoors and use the barbecue.

#### 9. Give your A/C some TLC

Check your air filters regularly and replace as needed. And don't forget the condenser – your A/C's outdoor unit. Clean out dried leaves or other debris, and trim foliage back at least two feet for good air circulation.

#### 10. Schedule a tune-up

If you've done all you can to keep your cooling system humming, call in the experts. Annual servicing by a licenced heating and cooling contractor can reduce your cooling costs by up to 10 per cent. Source: Hydro One Inc.







## National championships returning to Minden

Whitewater Ontario will welcome between 60 and 80 competitors who will battle it out on the Gull River next week as part of The Whitewater National Championships, which are returning to the Minden Whitewater Preserve after eight years.

It's an annual competition held to crown the national champions in Canoe Slalom, Downriver, Extreme Slalom and Freestyle. The format of having all these national championships together allows athletes to compete in multiple disciplines and compete for an overall title as well as success in their speciality. The Whitewater National Championships were last held in Minden in 2010.

Canoe Kayak Canada spokesman James Cartwright said they're expecting participants mainly from Ontario, Quebec, Alberta, BC and the Yukon Territory for the Aug. 14-18 competition.

"Canada's best whitewater paddlers will be attending this event and there will also be a handful of Olympians either racing or supporting the event," Cartwright said.

He added that some athletes will also be selected to represent Canada at the 2019 World Championships, the end of September in La Seu d'Urgell, Spain.

In conjunction with the championships, The Township of Minden Hills and Algonquin Outfitters are bringing the REEL Paddling Film Festival to town. It is being moved from the Northern Lights Performing Arts Pavilion in Haliburton to the grounds of the Minden museum. It will be held Friday, Aug. 16 at 8:30 p.m. People are encouraged to bring a lawn chair or blanket to sit on.

The night will feature the best paddling films in the world.

"You can be inspired to explore rivers, lakes and oceans, push extremes, embrace the paddling lifestyle and appreciate the wild places," the township and AO said.

Food, beverages and community vendors will be on site for the duration of the evening. Admission is by donation.

The preserve has previously hosted the 2015 Pam Am Games Canoe Kayak Slalom Competition, National Championships, National Team Trials and an ICF World Cup.





"In order for Ribfest to continue, we look for the business community of Haliburton and its neighbours to invest and support our event, so that we can continue to bring thousands of people together at this annual event," he said.

Brooks added that Ribfest brings in a considerable amount of additional revenue for the local economy, from hotel accommodations, to eateries, to service workers.


